In 2025, SWAN continued its work with strong commitment to supporting communities in some of the most remote and underserved regions of Nepal. Our work spanned education, maternal and child health, and women's empowerment through livelihood interventions. Our flagship projects reached districts such as Humla, Achham, Bajura, and Udayapur, while our scholarship programme extended hope to over 200 students across more than 15 districts.

One of the moments that filled me with both pride and gratitude was witnessing Katari Municipality in Udayapur step forward to match funds for our education and school development project. This was not just a financial contribution—it was a powerful acknowledgment of the impact we are creating together and a shared belief in the future of our children.

This year, I travelled extensively to our project areas and witnessed both the difficult conditions faced by children and women, as well as the transformative impact of our interventions. I still carry with me the memory of visiting a school in Humla where classrooms were broken, children sat on bare floors without desks, and teachers struggled without basic teaching materials

Those moments were deeply painful for me. But today, that pain has transformed into fulfillment. We have been able to build a new school block with three spacious classrooms, established gender-friendly toilets, and ensured access to safe drinking water—benefiting over 300 children and teachers. Now, when I see children laughing, learning, and simply being children in a safe and joyful space, it fills me with a sense of fulfillment that's hard to put into words.

ABOUT SWAN NEPAL

SWAN has been providing hopes in the lives of rural women and children of Nepal by focusing on four thematic goals – education, health, livelihoods, water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH). Also, we incorporate ecotourism, gender equality and social inclusion (GESI), and emergency response as major cross-cutting issues for the sustainability of our programmes. As a development and humanitarian organization, our effort focuses on needy children, disadvantaged women and marginalized communities, mostly working in Nepal's remote communities.

In the past, we have worked in Sindhupalchowk, Parbat, Gorkha, Nuwakot, Mugu, Chitwan, and Humla. Currently, we are working in Baglung, Udayapur, Kavrepalanchok, Achham, Bajura and Humla. We work in close collaboration with government line agencies, municipalities, rural municipalities, key stakeholders, schools and communities, and over the past 31 years, we have witnessed some remarkable difference in the lives of individuals/communities we work with. In addition, we also responded to humanitarian crises like earthquake 2015, COVID-19 Pandemic and flood 2024 by implementing life-saving interventions to those in need.

SUCCESS STORY:

IMPROVED FACILITIES AT SHREE DEWAL BASIC SCHOOL PAVES A WAY FOR A BRIGHT FUTURE FOR CHILDREN IN TUMCHA, HUMLA

For years, Shree Dewal Basic School in Tumcha village in Humla struggled with poor infrastructure, leaving both students and teachers disheartened. “Our children were learning in a school that could collapse at any time,” recalled former Head Teacher Kali Bahadur Rawat, who had appealed for urgent support in September 2024.

Back then, the school lacked basic facilities such as adequate classrooms, furniture, toilets, and clean drinking water – conditions that adversely affected both attendance and learning outcomes in this remote Himalayan community.

Today, that reality has changed. With support from SWAN, the school now has a newly constructed three-room building including gender-friendly toilets and a handwashing facility. The provincial government has further contributed two school blocks with six classrooms, significantly improving learning space for students.

KB Buda, an 8th grader and one of the top students in his class, said the transformation has reshaped their daily school life. “Our



school used to feel completely unsafe and didn’t feel like a proper school,” he said. “Now we feel safe, and the school has facilities like a library, computer lab, furniture, and a mid-day meal programme. We can finally focus on our studies with confidence.”

Bipana Shahi, a local woman, echoed similar relief, “We are thrilled to see the newly built school infrastructure, including the gate and compound wall. My two children now happily go to school every day and excited to learn computers. I hope the school continues to focus on quality education.”

Head Teacher Madan Buda said the change has been dramatic. “We now have safe and sufficient classrooms for all our students,” he said, adding that the school’s environment has shifted “from hopelessness to hope and confidence for a brighter future.”

“This project created a safe learning environment for children,” said, Ms. Kalpana Karki, Programme Director, SWAN. “We will continue to support the school through scholarships, teacher support, classroom management, learning materials, and mid-day meal programmes. These efforts aim to ensure holistic education, strengthen school development and sustain long-term educational progress in Humla.”

CASE STORY:

TRAINED TEACHERS BRING JOY AND EXPERTISE BACK TO CLASSROOM

At Shree Janajyoti Basic School in Katari Municipality, Grade One teacher Kaushila Rai once struggled with limited confidence and relied largely on rote learning to teach her students. “Earlier, I didn’t have the techniques to teach young children effectively”, She said. Today, her classroom tells a different story.

With support from SWAN through the LEAP programme, implemented in partnership with the local partner, Collaborative Social Network (CSN), Kaushila says her teaching approach and her students learning experience have been transformed. In Katari Municipality, Udayapur, the LEAP programme has reached five community schools, benefiting 23 teachers and 201 students, through structured teacher training, lesson planning support, workbooks, and continuous classroom coaching.

Kaushila shared that the training gave her exposures to child-centered pedagogical approaches such as morning circle time, art and craft activities, structured lesson planning, behavior management techniques, and effective homework practices. She also highlighted the usefulness of interactive techniques such as “Hands Down,” “Pair and

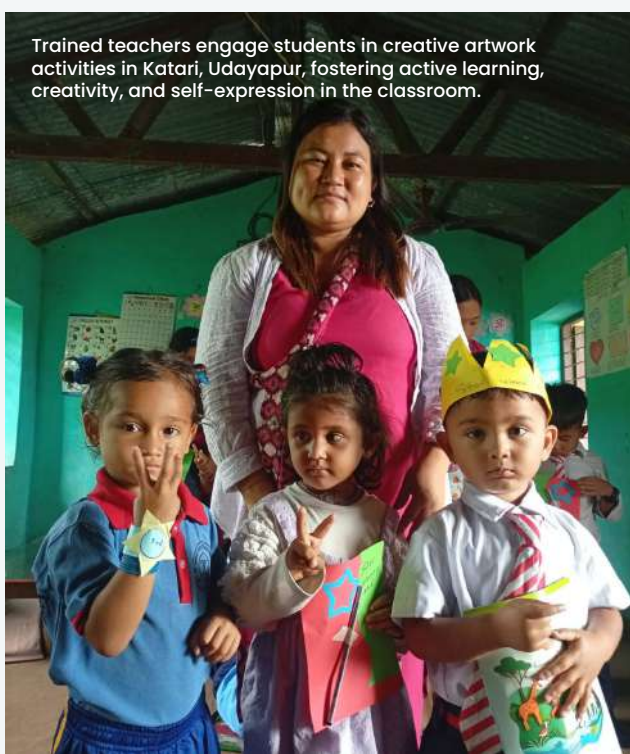
Share,” “Show You Know,” and flashcards, which have increased student participation and interest in learning new things.

“We have not only created a child-friendly environment but also strengthened foundational skills in reading, writing, and basic mathematics,” she added.

As classrooms become more engaging, children are learning with greater confidence, and teachers like Kaushila are rediscovering joy in teaching. For Kaushila, the change is deeply personal. “I am grateful to SWAN for strengthening my teaching skills and empowering both teachers and young learners,” she added with smile on her face.

2 | MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH PROJECT

SWAN works to ensure quality maternal and child health care services at the community level, particularly in the remote areas of Nepal. Since 2010, SWAN has implemented life-saving interventions to improve maternal and child health in districts such as Baglung and Humla.

SWAN has been implementing the “Maternal and Child Health (MCH) Project in Achham and Bajura” with the funding support from the Global Envirotech Initiative (GEI), and North East Ohio Medical University (NEOMED), USA. The MCH project is being implemented in three municipalities in Bajura district – Budinanda Municipality, Jagannath Rural Municipality, and SwamikartikKhapar Rural Municipality and two rural municipalities in Achham district – Ramaroshan and Chaurpati Rural Municipalities.

Improving Maternal & Child Health Outcomes



CAPACITY BUILDING:

We capacitate local health workers in helping babies breathe (HBB) and helping mothers survive (HMS) training in managing maternal-neonatal emergencies. We also provide training to Health Facility Operation and Management Committee (HFOMC) on leadership and health facility management roles.



LOCAL GOVERNMENT COORDINATION:

We collaborate with the local government to implement all project activities to scale-up project impact and ensure sustainability. We strengthen the referral system in the project area.



MONITORING AND ACCOUNTABILITY:

We strengthen systematic collection of pregnancy, delivery and infant data along with regular review of deaths and health outcomes.



COMMUNITY OUTREACH:

We engage and sensitize mother's groups, FCHVs and key community members on antenatal care, postnatal care, and institutional delivery. We train FCHVs in birth preparedness package (BPP) to ensure safe delivery.



UPGRADE EQUIPMENT+ INFRASTRUCTURE:

We support and upgrade critical equipment to the BCs according to the medical standard. We ensure safe, clean, and functional delivery rooms with adequate WASH facilities.

RENOVATION AND EQUIPMENT SUPPORT IN KOLTI HOSPITAL, **BAJURA**

In 2025, **SWAN** with the funding of GEI USA, completed the renovation and maintenance of the Kolti Hospital in Bajura as part of the Maternal and Child Health Project in Achham and Bajura. The primary goal of these renovation and maintenance efforts, along with equipment support was to provide high-quality maternal and child health care in Kolti Hospital, which is the referral center for Bajura and adjoining districts such as Mugu and Humla.

The renovation work included the installation of tiles in the maternity ward, wooden ceiling, wall painting, the provision of handwashing basins, and the maintenance of toilets to ensure clean and hygienic conditions for maternal and neonatal care. SWAN also provided Operation Theatre (OT) lights to ensure safe deliveries, particularly during C-sections and complicated births.



The transformation of the Kolti Basic Health Facility—through renovation, maternity ward upgrades, toilets maintenance, and the provision of critical equipment like Operation Theatre (OT) lights—stands as a life-saving contributions made by SWAN and GEI USA, bringing hope and better healthcare to the people of Bajura and nearby districts.

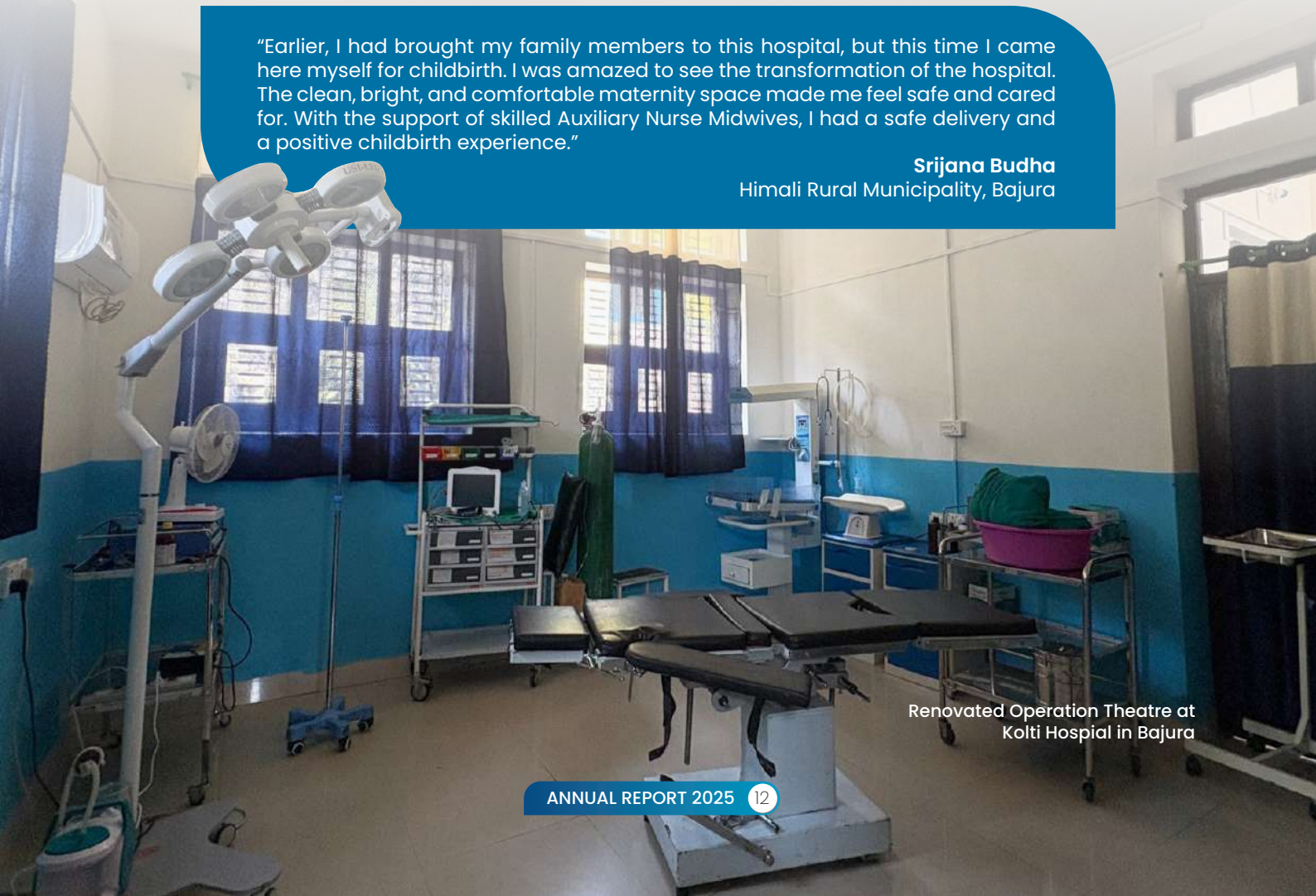

Cross-cutting theme

Livelihood activity in Achham and Bajura under MCH Project

Under the MCH Project, SWAN supported 38 women farmers in Ramaroshan Rural Municipality, Achham, and Pandusain Municipality, Bajura, to adopt climate-smart agriculture farming practices. In addition, farmers were supported with essential agricultural materials such as seed trays and polybags, vegetable seeds, organic and chemical fertilizers, plastic sheets, climate smart agriculture (CSA) materials including pheromone traps, cue-lure traps, and yellow sticky traps to name a few.

This project enhanced sustainable livelihoods, food security, and improved health and well-being in remote communities while addressing poverty, social exclusion, and dependence on subsistence farming.

In 2025, local farmers cultivated organic vegetables (such as chilli, zucchini, tomato, cucumber and pumpkin) on their own land – for both household consumption and income generation.

CASE STORY:

GREENHOUSE FARMING CREATES NEW INCOME OPPORTUNITIES FOR WOMAN FARMERS IN ACHHAM

A 42-year-old Mina Rawal from Ward No. 2 of Ramaroshan Rural Municipality, Achham lived a life familiar to many women in remote areas of Nepal—dependent on subsistence farming and husband income only. As a family of six, she cultivated maize, barley and wheat mainly for survival, while vegetables were grown only in small quantities for household consumption. She never imagined, vegetable farming could bring financial independence to women. “There were

very limited opportunities for woman like me to earn independently,” she said.

Her life changed after joining the “Pipalrukha women’s group” supported by SWAN with funding from GEI, USA. She received improved vegetable seeds, training on climate-smart agriculture practices, and greenhouse support, which introduced her to commercial vegetable farming techniques.

In her first season, she sold 55 kgs of tomatoes in the local market, earning between Rs 80 and Rs 100 per kg depending on market prices. “For the first time, I felt I could truly support my family,” she said.

This season, her greenhouse is full of cucumbers, tomatoes, beans, and zucchini. Mina said, “I sold 23 kilograms of beans at Rs 80 per kg and continues to harvest fresh produce for both household use and the local market.”

According to Mina, the earnings have helped cover school supplies for her children, household costs, and medical treatment. She has also started saving money in a local cooperative for the future.

“Earlier we only grew vegetables for ourselves. Now we also earn from them,” she said. “It has given me confidence and hope for the future.”

3 Empowering Marginalized Women through Livelihoods Project in Katari Municipality, Udayapur

SWAN continued to improve the quality of life of disadvantaged and marginalized women through the income generation programme (IGP) and leadership skills. A total of 200+ community members were benefited from this project. These interventions were strategically designed to ensure that women, regardless of their social background and the challenges of marginalization and poverty, can achieve education, empowerment, and financial independence.

CLIMATE-SMART AGRICULTURE FARMING:

This year, 20 local farmers cultivated key vegetables, including chilli, tomato, cucumber, bitter gourd, and zucchini, under both tunnel/greenhouse and open-field farming systems, using alternative farming skills supported by SWAN.

The training combined classroom sessions with hands-on field demonstrations covering nursery management, crop care, pest and disease control, organic fertilizer preparation (Jholmal), and climate-resilient farming techniques. In addition, participants were supported with essential agricultural materials such as seed trays and polybags, vegetable seeds, organic and chemical fertilizers, plastic sheets, climate smart agriculture (CSA) materials including pheromone traps, cue-lure traps, and yellow sticky traps to name a few. The training strengthened farmers skills, identified motivated participants, and promoted sustainable practices and contributed to improved productivity and increased income generation.

SEWING AND TAILORING TRAINING:

SWAN provided a three-month sewing and tailoring programme for 10 marginalized women, strengthening vocational skills, self-reliance, and livelihood opportunities through hands-on training and provision of essential tools this year.

FINANCIAL LITERACY TRAINING:

In 2025, SWAN organized financial literacy training for 95 marginalized women, in partnership with the local Bank, to enhance the financial knowledge and skills of participants. The training covered topics like personal finance, savings, investments, credit, and bookkeeping. This training aims to help women by teaching them how to manage their money, use financial services, and create better economic opportunities.



GOAT RAISING AND SHED MANAGEMENT TRAINING:

This year, SWAN provided shed management training and hybrid goats to 10 women farmers. The training focused on basic care of the goats including feeding techniques, diseases management, and commercial goat farming and its financial benefits.

CASE STUDY:

FROM STITCHING TO FINANCIAL EMPOWERMENT

Sabita Yogi, 28, from Katari Municipality, Udayapur, belongs to a marginalized community. Her husband works in the Gulf country, and the family previously relied on a limited income.

But her story has changed today. After completing a three-month “sewing and tailoring training” Sabita becomes skilled to start her own business from home. She now stitches blouses, kurthasurwal, and pants for school children.” Since I’m not educated, I thought I’d always have to depend on my husband to make a living. But now I make Rs 8,000–10,000 per month through my tailoring business,” she said.

“Many women don’t want to go to town as tailoring is expensive there. I provide

services at a reasonable price from home, take orders directly and they also like my work,” Sabita explained. “I enjoy stitching kurtha surwal for women because many women in my community wear it, and it is also my favorite outfit,” she shared with a laughter.

Sabita hopes to pursue advanced training to expand her skills further.” I am very grateful to SWAN for providing me this opportunity. It has built my confidence and empowered me,” she expressed.

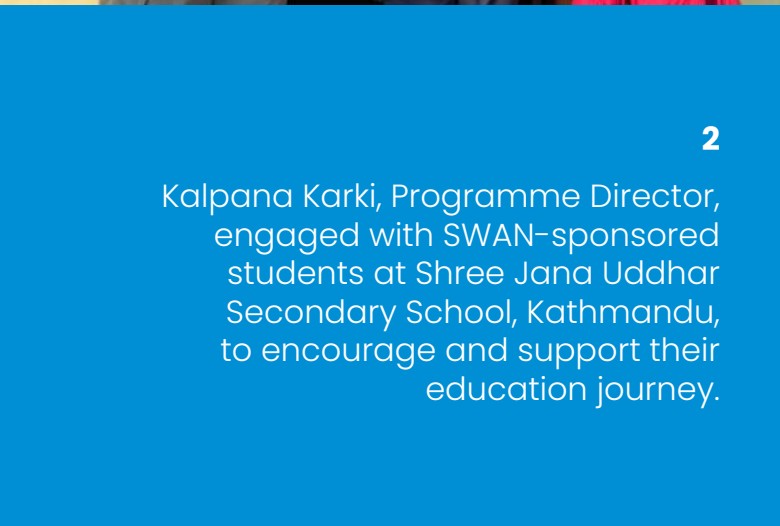
Sewing and tailoring training has proven to be a life-changing intervention for women like Sabita who aspire to run small businesses from home and achieve financial independence.

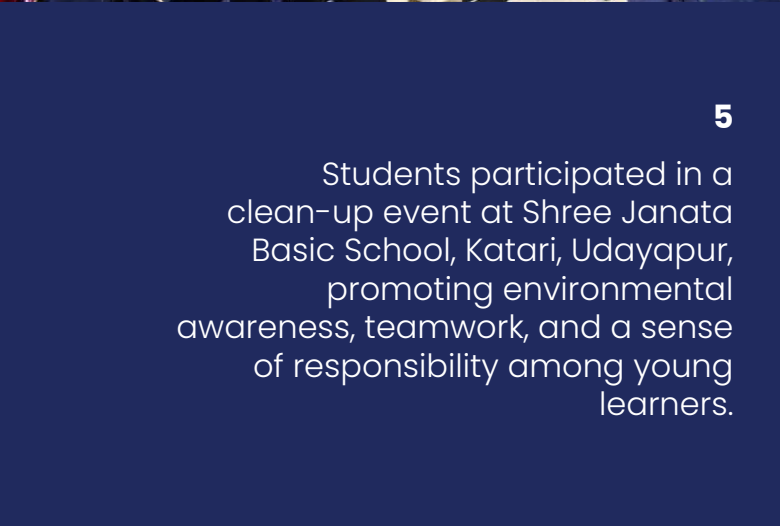

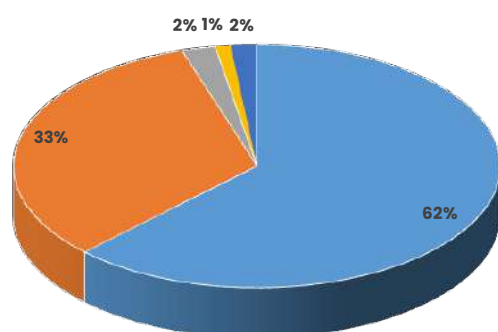

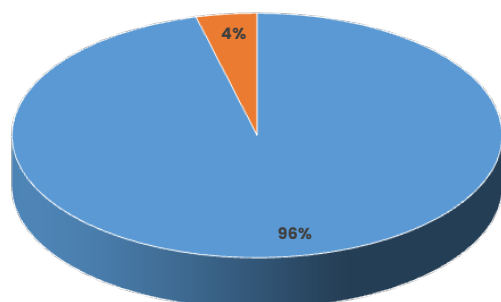
